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Flower of the Month: *Lilac!*



Victorian meaning is: "First emotion of love!"

If you're from the east coast, you may associate the advent of spring with lilacs. In the floral industry we start to see them in the markets around November. This fall batch is generally imported from

Holland and tends to be a bit on the scrawny side and expensive. If you can (and I know some of you can't), wait for the spring when it's available from local sources - the stems will be stunningly lush.

Although lilac is not native to the U.S., these fragrant flowers have a colonial history dating back to the 1700's: both Thomas Jeffer-

son and George Washington planted these flowering shrubs. And the Arnold Arboretum of Harvard University notes that the oldest living lilacs North America may have been planted at

What flower works well with Lilacs?

I love lilac by itself - one large lush bunch.

One of my favorite pairings, though, is with viburnum. The soft apple green globes which also grow on a woody stem, offer a delicate contrast to purple lilac; against a white lilac, a simple crispness.

For a sumptuous, romantic look add some peonies. a lot of good information.

Eco: "Fresher Flower Petals!"

Did you ever hug your Grandmother or Aunt and have it smell like you were in a garden?

Remember opening a draw and having the smell of Lilac, Lavender, Roses or orange blossom wafer up to you.

Do you remember sewing sachet in school and stuffing them with dried lavender flowers ?

Well someone is still thinking and providing fresh and fabulous freeze dried flower petals, that are plucked from a premium flower at its freshness peak.



Vase life for most varieties averages 5 to 9 days.

2. To promote water uptake, make a 2 to 3 inch vertical cut up the center of the woody stem.

3. Lilac is sensitive to ethylene, so keep them away from fruits & vegetables.

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These frozen flower petals are known to look fresher than those you picked from your garden and they come in a variety of single colors and specialty color blends. But unlike fresh flower petals, freeze-dried petals will not wilt or stain clothing.

These fresh flower petals are

perfect for scenting your home, decorating a wedding aisle or decorating a table at a special event-indoors or out. Freeze dried flower petals are natural and environmentally friendly and always beautiful to look at.
