# Flower of the Month: Colorful Tulips



About 400 years ago the herbalist Clusius brought tulip bulbs from Turkey to Leiden, where they first flowered in the local Hortus Botanicus (botanical gardens). Clusius was the prefect of the Hortus Botanicus responsible for both the introduction and propagation of tulips. Although tulips were discovered in the 16th century in Turkey, many varieties actually originated from North Africa, Central Asia and Europe. The latest variety to be introduced is Tulipa "Armani". It takes an average of 20 years to develop & launch a new tulip, reports the Flower Council of Holland. The "Armani" variety is bi-colored: deep red turning to white at the margins with a subtle paler red blending the red with the white.

Tulips can be grown from bulbs available in the fall. They must be chilled first for approximately 6 weeks and then planted by Christmas. Tulip species include short low-growing plants to tall upright plants, growing from 4-27 inches tall. They can even grow in the cold and snowy winter. Plants typically have 2 to 6 leaves, with some species having up to 12 leaves.

your host and still have them fresh for the dinner?

A) Generally, I'd send them no more than a couple of days ahead of the dinner so they look their best, especially if the arrangement includes relatively short lived flowers like daffodils or tulips. However, if the flowers are fresh, they should last well past the date of the event.

**Q**) When changing the water in an arrangement – How often should you cut the ends off the flowers?

A) Every two to three days.

Q) When an arrangement comes with lemons or oranges (fruit)—how long can you leave the fruit in the arrangement?
A) Fruit is great in an arrange-

ment, whether it's mixed in with the flowers or sliced and put in the water. A couple of items to note when using fruit, however: Any time you introduce fruit into the water, you increase the level of bacteria and thus shorten the vase life of your arrangement. Also, fruit gives off an odorless gas called ethylene which, among other things, also shortens vase life for a number of flowers (some flowers are more sensitive than others, and some are not affected at all). Tulips, for example, show no response to ethylene.

**TIPS & TRICKS WITH TULIPS!** 

## 1. Vase life is generally 3 to 7 days.

2. Tulips may grow up to 2 inches after being cut.

3. Tulips will bend & dance toward the light and will conform to the shape of the container.

4. Never slit tulip stem near the flower in an effort to avoid drooping, as this will only reduce nutrient uptake and shorten vase life.
